Fiscal Impact Summary

This bill would increase school district Federal Funds beginning in FY 2018-19 by \$3,600,000 over a five-year period from additional Educational Rate Program funding for state-funded four-year old kindergarten students.

This bill requires that a child attending a state-funded four-year old kindergarten program must be considered an elementary school student for purposes of the federal Educational Rate Program (E-rate). E-rate provides discounts to help eligible schools in the United States obtain affordable telecommunications and internet access. The program funding derives from Universal Service Fees collected from telecommunications carriers under the oversight of the Federal Communications Commission. Category Two funding through the E-rate program provides a discount of \$150 per student over a five-year period for expenditures on internal connections, managed internal broadband services, or basic maintenance of internal connections. Based on

2016 135-day enrollment data, this bill would increase the number of students eligible for the federal E-rate funding by the 24,000 state-funded four-year old kindergarten students. At \$150 per student, this would increase school district Federal Funds by \$3,600,000 over a five-year period. A school can decide if it wants to spend all of its Category Two funding in one year or spread it out over any of the five years. Due to federal application requirements and the date this bill may be enacted, we expect school districts will apply for these additional federal funds beginning in FY 2018-19.
